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THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

NATIONAL MEDIATION BOARD

I. SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

1. GENERAL

The fiscal year ended June 30, 1947, marks the thirteenth year of the National Mediation Board and the twenty-first year of the Railway Labor Act. The National Mediation Board was created in 1934 by amendments to the original act of 1926. Jurisdiction of the Board, originally confined to common carriers by railroad, was extended to include common carriers by air by amendments approved April 10, 1936.

During the past fiscal year strikes and threatened strikes were common on the American industrial scene. There were very few days during the year when the Board was not faced with threatened interruption to rail or air transport service as a result of unsettled labor. disputes. For the most part procedures of the law for effecting peaceful settlements and avoiding interruptions to service were effectively applied and the threatened interruptions prevented. As a result, in scores of cases, substantial financial loss to the industries covered by the law, to their employees and loss in service to the public were avoided by the orderly settlement of disputes as contemplated by the law. While the effectiveness of the act has been demonstrated many times, its failure in a few cases during the year serves to emphasize the need for its provisions and alertness in applying its step-by-step procedures for achieving peaceful settlements of disputes over changes in rates of pay, rules, or working conditions. These include direct negotiation, mediation, arbitration, and investigation by presidential emergency boards in the more serious disputes where there is danger of a substantial section of the country being denied essential transportation service by reason of a threatened interruption arising out of unsettled labor disputes. The act also provides for the complete independence of carriers and their employees in the matter of selforganization and designation of representatives for collective bargain-The act includes procedures for settlement of representation disputes among employees and for settlement of grievances or disputes growing out of the interpretation or application of labor agreement rules.

By far the most costly strike during the year involved a dispute over wages and rules between Transcontinental & Western Air, Inc., and its pilots as represented by the Air Line Pilots Association. After exhausting procedures of the Railway Labor Act for settling the dispute, the employees struck on October 21, 1946. The work stoppage grounded all flights on the carrier's domestic and foreign operations and resulted in lay-offs for several thousand nonstriking employees. Although mediation failed to achieve a settlement before the strike, conferences were continued after the stoppage became effective. After conferences over a period of 3 weeks the parties agreed at 5:15 a. m. on November 15, 1946, to refer the dispute for settlement to a three-man arbitration board. This settlement, as finally agreed upon, was available to the parties before the strike, and if accepted at that time would, of course, have resulted in great savings to all concerned. Thus, where force gained the upper hand in the work stoppage the disputing parties finally relied upon reason in

settling their differences.

During 1946, the prolonged strike of some 300 employees of the Toledo, Peoria & Western Railroad Co. was brought to an end. The strike extended from October 1, 1945, when operation of the road was returned to private management by the Office of Defense Transportation which operated the property during the war. The dispute which led to the strike extends back to 1941 and involved efforts of the employees to secure the same wages and working conditions as are in effect on class I railroads generally throughout the country. Adamant refusal of the carrier management to agree to the employee requests led to one of the most bitter and prolonged labor disputes in recent railroad history. Striking employees lost their lives and the carrier's president was assassinated under mysterious circumstances which have not yet been solved. Following his death the new management made agreements with the striking employees which terminated the strike on April 22, 1947, nearly 19 months after it began.

Other strikes during 1946 on carriers covered by the Railway Labor Act were of short duration or minor importance. In a year when postwar adjustments and mounting prices have caused widespread labor unrest it can be reported that the procedures of the act for effectuating peaceful settlements and preventing work stoppages have been applied with notable success. As important as the procedures themselves in achieving this record are the skills applied by experienced mediators on the Board's staff as well as public-spirited men who have served as arbitrators, referees, and emergency board members under the law.

During 1947 the effectiveness of mediation and arbitration was demonstrated in achieving peaceful settlements. Thus of the 239 disputes disposed of during the year involving changes in rates of pay, rules, or working conditions, 132, or 55 percent, were settled through mediation. In 20 disputes, settlements were secured by inducing the parties to submit their disputes to arbitration. Thus, a total of 152 disputes, or 64 percent of the total, was settled through the processes of mediation or arbitration.

During the year a total of 524 applications for services of the Board was received. Of this number 458 were docketed as formal cases. The remaining 66 applications were closed out through correspondence. Compared with 1946, there was an increase of 5 percent in cases docketed and a decline of 28 percent in cases closed, with a net result that at the start of the year there were 94 disputes pending on the Board's docket and by the year's end this number increased to 129.

2. MEDIATION PROCEEDINGS

Under section 5, first, of the Railway Labor Act, the National Mediation Board is charged with the responsibility of mediating disputes growing out of the negotiation of agreements between management and labor organizations governing rates of pay, rules, and working condi-The act stresses the obligation of both parties to endeavor diligently to compose such differences through direct negotiations. The mediatory services of the Board are invoked only when direct negotiations between the parties have failed or there has been a refusal of one of the parties to confer. Mediation, under the Board's method of procedure, is informal in nature, and many times reinstates the direct-bargaining technique, under the auspices and with the assistance of the mediator. In effect, mediation usually means a continuation of direct negotiation between the parties to the dispute. Settlements reached through mediation improve the feeling between the disputants, and tend toward direct settlement of future difficulties without the help of the Board.

In the event that a dispute fails of settlement in mediation, section 7 of the act requires the Board to urge the parties to submit their controversy to arbitration. While settlements through mediation are always preferable, certain situations arise in which one or the other of the parties may prefer that a final and binding award be made by a neutral, and the arbitration provisions of the act provide this channel. During the past fiscal year, the arbitration features of the act have been used more often than in any preceding year in the history of

the present Board.

Under section 10 of the Railway Labor Act, the National Mediation Board may recommend to the President the establishment of an emergency board, when, in the Board's judgment, an unsettled dispute between a carrier and its employees threatens a substantial interruption to interstate commerce. During the 1947 fiscal year nine emergency boards were created by Executive order, eight of which reported to the President before the close of the year.

In addition to the section 10 emergency boards, 13 panel emergency boards were *set*up by the Chairman of the National Railway Labor Panel under Executive Orders 9172 and 9299. A review of the disputes investigated by both section 10 and panel emergency boards will

be found in chapter V of this report.

Chapter II of this report, under the caption "Mediation Disputes," describes the Board's mediation activities during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1947, and outlines some of the mediation problems with which the Board has been confronted. It also includes statistical tables reflecting the performance during the year compared with previous years of the Board's experience under the act.

3. REPRESENTATION DISPUTES

Under the Railway Labor Act employees are free to join, organize, or assist in organizing the labor organization of their choice and, in exercising these rights, they are protected against carrier influence or discrimination. The law provides a procedure for settlement of disputes between employees as to who are their duly authorized representatives. In case such a controversy arises, the Board is

required to investigate, take a secret ballot or use any other appropriate method for determining the majority choice of the employees, and to certify the name of the organization or individual thus designated and authorized to represent the particular craft or class of

employees.

The Board requires applications for its services to be supported by a sufficient number of signed authorizations from the employees involved to establish the existence of a dispute. Such authorizations serve as prima facie evidence of a dispute and if verified by an on-theground investigation by one of the Board's mediators he is directed to conduct an election or use any other appropriate means for ascer-

taining the duly authorized representative of the employees.

After certifications are issued it is the policy of the Board not to conduct repeat election until the organization certified has had a reasonable period to function as the duly authorized representative of the employees. Formerly, 1 year was allowed before a repeat election was conducted. However, under rules promulgated by the Board effective May 1, 1947, this period was extended to 2 years. The policy of the Board in this connection derives from the law which imposes upon both carriers and employees the duty to exert every reasonable effort to make and maintain agreements. Obviously this basic purpose of the law cannot be realized if the representation issue is raised too frequently

During the 13-year period since the representation provisions were included as a part of the Railway Labor Act, the Board has disposed of 1,918 representation disputes and in 1,594 or 88 percent of these, representation rights have been established by issuance of certifica-The number of representation disputes continues large year after year. This is due to two main factors. In the first place, as knowledge of the law becomes more widespread, employees not previously organized have exercised their rights under the law and designated representatives for the first time. During recent years, on the railroads, this has been particularly true of supervisory, technical, and engineering employees. In the airline industry unionization is not so widespread as on railroads. However, a number of unions are active in organizing airline employees. New groups in this industry among whom representation elections were conducted during 1947 include clerical, office, stores, fleet, and passenger service employees and stewardesses. Secondly, many representation disputes arise out of the competition between labor organizations. On the railroads and airlines contests between C. I. O. and A. F. of L. unions are common. In addition, on the railroads, many disputes arise out of the competition between the so-called standard railroad labor organizations many of which are not affiliated with either the A. F. of L. or the C. I. O.

During 1947, a total of 181 representation disputes were disposed of by the Board as compared with 210 during the previous year. The Board's activities in this field are discussed in chapters II and III.

4. NATIONAL RAILROAD ADJUSTMENT BOARD

The 1934 amendments to the Railway Labor Act created the National Railroad Adjustment Board to hear and decide disputes involving employee grievances and controversies over the application

and interpretation of agreements.

The Adjustment Board is composed of four divisions, on which the carriers and the employees are equally represented. diction of each division is described specifically in section 3, first (h), The headquarters of the Adjustment Board are estabof the act. lished by the law in Chicago, Ill.

When any divisions are unable to agree upon an award because of a deadlock among its members, the law requires the division to attempt to select a referee to sit with it as a member and render an Failing to agree upon the selection of a referee, this fact may be certified to the National Mediation Board, which is then required to make the appointment.

While the Second, Third, and Fourth Divisions have discharged their functions in a commendable manner during the years since their creation in 1934, the same cannot be said of the First Division. is due in part to the fact that the First Division is called upon to handle more than four times the number of cases handled by the other three

divisions combined.

The fact remains, however, that the First Division is still far from achieving prompt settlements of disputes involving train and engine service employees. The situation outlined in our last annual report has not improved during the past fiscal year. Inability to make prompt awards has created a large backlog of pending cases. ployee organizations, dissatisfied with long delays, have resorted to other techniques in securing settlements. Some of the organizations have withdrawn cases pending before the Division and have declined to submit new cases, preferring to achieve settlements by direct negotiations. When such negotiations fail, strikes are sometimes threatened, thereby creating emergencies under the provisions of section 5, first, of the act. In such cases the Mediation Board, in its efforts to prevent interruptions to commerce, proffers mediation serv-During the past year there have been a number of such instances and a great amount of time has been spent by the Board and its mediators in preventing strikes in such situations. Although the Board has had some success in composing such disputes by mediation, settlements achieved in this manner are not in accord with the spirit of the act. It provides procedures for settlement through the arbitration machinery of the First Division, in recognition of the fact that such disputes involve differing views over the settlement of grievances or the interpretation or application of agreement rules. Disputes of this kind, by their very nature, lend themselves more practicably to decision by consideration of relevant facts rather than by a compromise settlement such as results in mediation. Of particular importance to the Mediation Board is the fact that time spent on mediation cases of this kind is at the expense of regular mediation cases. The rise in the number of pending cases on the Board's docket during the past year is largely due to the necessity of using a considerable amount of mediator time in efforts to settle disputes that properly should be referred to the First Division.

The situation which prevents the First Division from functioning in a manner contemplated by the law reflects an excessively large number of disputes which are not being settled on the individual railroads. This is a problem which addresses itself to the carrier managements and the brotherhood representatives on the railroads where failure to effect settlements allows an excessive number of unsettled disputes to accumulate. More diligence and flexibility of attitudes will result in fewer unsettled disputes to refer to the First Division. On too many carriers the First Division is looked upon as a substitute for settling disputes on the property rather than as a supplemental procedure.

In addition, the carriers and the brotherhoods should endeavor to agree upon procedural changes in the work of the First Division as

a means of expediting settlement.

The Mediation Board considers the inability of the First Division to keep abreast of its work to be one of the most serious administrative deficiencies under the act. The railroads and brotherhoods must exert constant diligent efforts to arrive at a solution of this most pressing problem. If they fail to exert such effort or fail to agree on a workable program to correct the present unhealthy conditions, it appears to be inevitable that the remedy will lie with the Congress.

The work of the Adjustment Board during the past year is reviewed in chapter VII and annual reports of the four divisions are given in appendix A to this report. In addition, table 15 shows the number

of cases docketed and disposed of for the past 5 fiscal years.

5. LABOR CONTRACTS

Section 5, third (e) of the Railway Labor Act requires all carriers subject to the law to file with the Board a copy of each contract with employees covering rates of pay, rules, or working conditions. The law also requires that changes, revisions, or supplements to such contracts shall be filed with the Board.

As of June 30, 1947, there was a total of 4,937 basic labor agreements on file with the Board. To note the increase in the number of agreements covering employees under the act it is interesting to compare the above total with 3,021 which is the number of such contracts on file on June 30, 1935. In addition to the basic contracts there are filed each year with the Board hundreds of supplemental agreements, revisions, and memoranda of understanding on various subjects.

Table 12 of this report shows the increase in the number of such contracts from year to year since the act was amended in 1934.

6. AMENDMENT TO STABILIZATION ACT OF 1942

The wage stabilization provisions of the Stabilization Act of 1942 was applicable to carriers and employees subject to the Railway Labor Act. This control was continued during the transition from war to peace by Executive Order 9697 of February 14, 1946. However, on November 1, 1946, Executive Order 9801 removed wage and salary controls adopted pursuant to the Stabilization Act. Thus, since the latter date there has been no control of wage or salary increases for employees covered by the Railway Labor Act.

II. RECORD OF CASES

1. CASES HANDLED BY THE BOARD

Labor disputes subject to the jurisdiction of the National Mediation Board are generally divided into three different groups:

(1) Disputes involving representation of employees by various labor

organizations for the purposes of collective bargaining.

(2) Disputes between carriers and their employees concerning changes in rates of pay, rules, or working conditions not adjusted by the parties in conference.

(3) The interpretation of agreements reached through mediation, where disputes arise between the parties as to the meaning or applica-

tion of such agreements.

Disputes in the above three categories are designated for purposes of the Board's records as representation, mediation, and interpretation

cases, respectively.

During the fiscal year 1947, a total of 426 dispute cases were disposed of under the provisions of the Railway Labor Act. This number is substantially less than during 1946 when 589 cases were settled. Moreover, during 1947, a total of 458 new cases were docketed as compared to 436 new cases during the previous year. As a result of a larger number of dispute cases docketed during 1947 and a smaller number settled, the backlog of pending disputes awaiting the services of a mediator increased from 94 at the end of 1946 to 126 at the end of the fiscal year 1947.

The number of disputes disposed of during 1947 was 28 percent less than during the previous year. Although the reduction was felt in both mediation and representation disputes decline in the former was much greater. Thus in 1946, a total of 379 mediation disputes was settled and in 1947 this number declined to 426, a reduction of 36 percent. The decline in representation disputes settled was from

210 in 1946 to 181 in 1947, a reduction of 14 percent.

The decline in the number of cases settled during 1947 is attributable to two major reasons. In mediation cases, as discussed in chapter I, the reduction is due to the necessity of assigning a large proportion of our staff of senior mediators to grievance cases which under the law are referable for settlement to the First Division of the National Railroad Adjustment Board. Usually such disputes involve hundreds of grievances and attempting to settle them through mediation consumes a great deal of time. During the past year the time of mediators which has been devoted to efforts to settle such disputes through mediation has resulted in a decrease in settlements in regular mediation disputes and an increase in the number of such disputes awaiting mediation.

The decline in the settlement of representation cases during 1947 was principally due to one large dispute involving shop craft employees of the Pennsylvania Railroad. There were over 52,000 employees

involved in this dispute and effecting its settlement required the services of practically all of our mediators regularly assigned to representation cases as well as two mediators who are usually assigned to

mediation disputes.

Thus, the cause of decline in representation disputes settled was temporary and a part of the Board's usual work under the act. The decline in mediation settlements, on the other hand, is due to the necessity of using mediators in grievance disputes which are not properly subject to mediation under the law. The failure of labor organizations to refer such disputes to the National Railroad Adjustment Board is a cause of grave concern to the National Mediation Board.

Before applications are formally docketed they are subjected to preliminary investigation with a view of developing all pertinent information. This procedure serves a dual purpose. First, a considerable number of applications are closed out through correspondence. Second, in cases which are docketed following such preliminary investigation, this procedure serves to clarify obscure points and facilitates the work of mediators in the field. During the fiscal year 1947, a total of 66 applications was disposed of through correspondence. Adding these applications to those received during the year, which were docketed, makes a grand total of 524 applications for the Board's services received during the fiscal year 1947. This compares to a total of 504 applications received during 1946 and 606 during 1945.

Table 1 summarizes the various types of cases received and disposed of from June 21, 1934, when the Board commenced operations, through June 30, 1947. During this 13-year period a total of 4,435 new cases was docketed. The inclusion of 96 pending disputes inherited from the United States Board of Mediation increases to 4,531 the total of cases requiring services since the Board began operation in 1934. As of June 30, 1947, settlements had been effected in 4,405 of these cases. Consistently through the years the number of mediation cases requiring services of the Board has been larger than representation cases. Mediation cases docketed during the 13-year period totaled 2,563 as compared to 1,877 representation cases. Similarly, during this period, 2,569 mediation cases were disposed of as compared with 1,818 representation cases. The percentage ratio is 58 and 42, respectively, for the 2 types of cases.

During the 13-year period 18 interpretation cases have been disposed of by the Board, which is considerably less than 1 percent of the total. During 1947, 4 requests to interpret mediation agreements were received and of this number all except 1 had been disposed of by

the year's end.

2. DISPOSITION OF CASES

During the fiscal year 1947, the Board disposed of 426 docketed disputes. The total of docketed cases includes 242 mediation cases, 181 representation disputes and 3 interpretation cases. Table 2 summarizes by methods of disposition all cases handled to conclusion by the Board during the 13 years of its operation. Data for the past 3 years are shown separately and annual averages are shown for the 5-year period 1935–39 and 1940–44.

REPRESENTATION DISPUTES

In the investigation of representation disputes under section 2, ninth, of the Railway Labor Act the Board is authorized to conduct elections by secret ballot or to utilize any other appropriate method of ascertaining the name of the duly authorized employee representatives. The law specifies that any method employed by the Board must insure the choice of representatives by the employees without interference, influence or coercion exercised by the carrier.

Of the 181 representation disputes disposed of during the year, 119 were by secret elections. Forty of these elections were conducted

exclusively by United States mail. In practically all elections it is necessary to send out some ballots by mail in order to afford voting opportunity to those eligible employees who are off work due to sickness, vacations, or other reasons and are thus unable to vote at the polling place. In general, elections are conducted entirely by mail among groups where employees are too widely scattered to make a personal ballot-box election practicable. Usually, a personal ballot is preferable where the concentration of employees is rather large at the various voting points, or where the class of employees involved might have difficulty in executing a mail ballot. The method is determined by the Board in each case after consideration of the

Thirty-five representation disputes were settled by checking signatures on authorization cards against signatures of employees as shown on carrier records such as canceled pay checks. This procedure is used only in cases where there is only 1 organization seeking representation of a group of employees and is usually confined to groups which have not previously been represented for collective bargaining These 35 cases represent 19 percent of the total number of representation cases settled during 1947. The ratio for the 13-year period 1935-47 is 22 percent.

In seven cases the Board's files were closed without certification when the count of ballots revealed that less than a majority of em-

ployees eligible to vote had cast valid ballots.

Sixteen applications for the Board's services in representation disputes were withdrawn during the past year after mediators had been assigned and their investigation on the ground had begun. In one case the application was withdrawn before the investigation was Three applications were dismissed when investigation showed that no representation dispute existed among the employees.

As shown in table 2, a grand total of 1,818 representation disputes was disposed of during the 13-year period from 1935 to 1947. Of this number 1,483, or 81 percent, were closed by the issuance of certifications following elections or checks of signatures on authorization cards. In 60 additional cases carriers voluntarily recognized the applicants as representing the employees without the issuance of a certification. Thus, representation rights have been established in 85 percent of the representation disputes investigated by the Board under the amended Railway Labor Act.

MEDIATION DISPUTES

Throughout the 13 years of this Board's history since 1934, its experience has shown that mediation agreements have been the most satisfactory method of settling disputes concerning changes in rates of pay, rules, and working conditions. Such disposition has usually been found by representatives of both management and labor to be more satisfactory than adjudication by a neutral arbitrator or by reference to an emergency board. A successful mediator is usually able to offer suggestions which may become the basis of a settlement. Mediation agreements usually produce a better feeling between the contesting parties which many times results in their ability to compose future controversies without resorting to the services of this Board.

On many occasions, disputes concerning rates and rules are settled during mediation, and the application for mediation is withdrawn by the invoking party. In other cases withdrawals are made to permit the resumption of direct negotiations between the parties, which often results in settlement.

During the fiscal year 1947, a total of 239 mediation cases was settled. This figure represents a reduction of 140 cases below the previous year. An explanation of a large part of this decrease will be found in the following section of this report. Of the 239 cases disposed of, 105, or approximately 44 percent, were settled by mediation agreements. This figure, 105, was a reduction of 116 from the number of mediation agreements consummated in the previous fiscal year.

Twenty-seven cases were withdrawn by the invoking parties during the process of mediation, and 21 were withdrawn prior to mediation. A total of 63 cases was closed during the fiscal year 1947 because of refusal to arbitrate by one or both of the parties. Of this number, 23 were closed account refusal of the carriers to arbitrate; 30 cases were closed after refusal of arbitration by the employees; and in the remaining 10 cases both parties declined to arbitrate the issues in dispute.

Of the total of 63 cases in which arbitration was declined, 13 were later submitted to panel emergency boards created under the provisions of Executive Orders 9172 and 9299. The panel emergency board set-up expired at the end of the 1947 fiscal year, and the 2 Executive orders just mentioned have been canceled. Also included in the above total of 63 are 9 cases which were later considered by emergency boards created by Executive order of the President in accordance with section 10 of the Railway Labor Act.

When in the Board's judgment mediation has been unsuccessful, it is then required by law to endeavor to induce the parties to the dispute to submit the issues between them to arbitration. Acceptance of arbitration is optional with the parties. During 1947 a total of 20 arbitration agreements was obtained by the Board and its mediators. This number produced a grand total of 88 cases submitted to arbitration in the 13 years of the present Board's existence.

The results of the mediation process as a whole, which includes mediation agreements, withdrawals during mediation, and agreements to arbitrate, constitute an over-all index to the results accomplished under the Railway Labor Act in the settlement of disputes involving changes in rates of pay, rules and working conditions. During the past fiscal year, 152 dispositions were effected through these 3 methods, this number being approximately 63 percent of the total number of mediation cases disposed of. The percentage of dispositions through these 3 methods for the entire 13 years of the Board's history is approximately 73.

PROBLEMS IN MEDIATION

As mentioned in the Board's report for the past 2 years, one of the principal duties of management and labor is to exhaust every possibility to compose their differences through the medium of direct negotiations. The Board continues to receive many applications for its mediation services in cases where there has been little, if any, effort made by the parties to come to an agreement through conferences between them. A number of such applications have been remanded to the parties for further negotiations prior to mediation, and in most of such instances the issues between them have been materially reduced. Much time of the parties and the Board's representatives can be saved if bona fide and honest efforts are made by the disputants to compose their differences prior to applying for mediation.

During the fiscal year 1947, the Board experienced a continuation on the part of the train and engine service organizations of the practice of setting strike dates on large dockets of grievances, time claims, etc., which should normally go before the First Division of the National Railroad Adjustment Board. Section 3 of the Railway Labor Act, which was added to the law by the 1934 amendments, created the National Railroad Adjustment Board for the specific purpose of considering and deciding disputes involving grievances, and the interpretation or application of agreement rules. Prior to 1934, the former United States Board of Mediation handled such disputes in mediation. Its docket of such cases became clogged, resulting in the spreading of strike votes and the setting of strike dates. This situation, more than any other factor, resulted in the passage of the 1934 amendments, which set up the National Railroad Adjustment Board, and relieved the Mediation Board of the duty of mediating grievances and rules interpretation cases.

For a number of years, the train and engine service organizations took such matters to the First Division of the Adjustment Board. However, the docket of that division became overloaded, resulting in long delays in the issuance of awards. Disputes also arose over

whether certain awards should be used as precedents in the settlement of similar subsequent claims. A decision made by the United States Supreme Court in June 1945, in the case of Elgin, Joliet & Eastern Ry. Co. v. G. W. Burley et al., in which the Court held that labor organizations should have an authorization from the employees involved in grievance cases in order to negotiate settlement of such grievances or handle them before the Adjustment Board, brought about the breaking point. For a considerable period after that decision, which was reaffirmed in a subsequent decision of the Supreme Court made in March 1926, the work of the First Division of the

Adjustment Board was practically at a standstill. This situation produced the effect of the organizations attempting to settle grievances and rules interpretation cases on the various carriers. A number of such settlements were made. In other instances, where the parties were unable to settle all their differences. strike dates were set, and the National Mediation Board, in the interest of preventing interruptions to rail transportation during the war, felt compelled to proffer its mediation services. At first, the Board did not attempt to mediate the large dockets of grievances, confining its efforts to mediating matters relating to rates of pay, rules, and working conditions. This resulted in the large dockets of grievance and rules interpretation cases going before emergency Most of these Boards pointed out in their recommendations that such matters should have been handled under the machinery provided in the Railway Labor Act; i. e., the National Railroad Adjustment Board.

Commencing in the fiscal year 1946-47, the Board felt it necessary to assume the task of actually mediating a number of these large dockets of grievances and time claims. This has resulted in a large amount of time spent during the past year in mediating such matters. This feature alone is largely responsible for the marked decrease in the number of mediation cases disposed of during the past fiscal year. On one carrier, two of the Board's best mediators have each spent over a year, with slight interruptions, in mediating large grievance dockets, one of which will probably remain in mediation for many

months to come.

In the opinion of the National Mediation Board, this situation needs prompt correction, both for the benefit of the organizations and the carriers, and to relieve this Board of duties not contemplated under the 1934 amendments. If the parties at interest are unable to find a solution, this Board renews the suggestion made in its 1946 annual report that the entire subject receive the prompt and careful attention of the Congress.

3. CARRIERS INVOLVED IN DISPUTES

Table 3 indicates the distribution of the Board's services among the various classes of carriers. During the year there were 130 class I carriers by railroad reporting to the Interstate Commerce Commission. Approximately 95 percent of the Nation's railroad workers are employed on these carriers and as would be expected it was on such carriers, rather than the smaller railroads, that most of the Board's

services were requested. Thus, of the 130 class I carriers, 128, or 98 percent, were involved in disputes considered by the Board during the year.

As shown in table 3 there are 18 major scheduled airlines in the country and all were involved in disputes considered by the Board during 1946.

4. MAJOR GROUPS OF EMPLOYEES INVOLVED IN CASES

Table 4 shows the number of cases settled during the year classified according to the major groups of employees involved. As in previous years train, engine, and yard service employees accounted for the largest number of disputes among railroad workers. Other crafts or classes accounting for a large number of disputes are clerical, office, station, and storehouse employees, dispatchers and maintenance of

equipment employees.

While disputes among railroad workers constitute the major portion of the Board's work the rapid growth of airline transportation has been accompanied by a comparable growth in the number of labor disputes among employees of this industry. Thus, in 1947, airline employees accounted for 78 disputes, or 22 percent, of the cases disposed of by the Board during the year. This compares with 10 percent in 1946 and 5 percent in 1945. With the growth in the airlines has come a broadening in the groups of airline employees desiring to bargain collectively under the terms of the law. Particularly noted among such groups during 1947 were hostesses and clerical, office, stores, fleet and passenger service employees.

Airlines included in this total are: Alaska, American, American Overseas, Braniff, Chicago & Southern, Colonial, Delta, Eastern, Inland, Mid-Continent, Northeast, National, Northwest, Pan American Airways, PCA, TWA, United and Western.

III. REPRESENTATION DISPUTES—ELECTIONS

1. ELECTIONS AND CERTIFICATION OF REPRESENTATIVES

The Board received and docketed 209 representation disputes during the fiscal year 1947. This number added to the 31 cases on hand at the start of the year makes a total of 240 representation disputes requiring the Board's services. Of this total, 181 cases were disposed of during the year leaving a balance of 59 disputes pending on the

Board's docket on June 30, 1947.

It will be noted from the above that the number of pending disputes increased during the year from 31 to 59. This increase is chiefly due to the necessity, during the latter half of the year, of using 6 mediators for a considerable period on 1 unusually large representation dispute involving some 52,000 shopcraft employees of the Pennsylvania Railroad. Use on this case of such a large proportion of our mediators usually assigned to representation disputes resulted in a smaller number of cases disposed of in 1947. Thus, 181 representation cases were settled during the year as compared to 210 in 1946.

Although the backlog on June 30, 1947, represents an increase of nearly 100 percent over the number pending at the beginning of the year it should be pointed out that none of the disputes pending at the year's end was abnormally large. Thus the Board hopes during the coming year to be able to achieve a substantial reduction in its backlog

of representation disputes awaiting investigation.

The desirability of prompt investigation of representation disputes was recognized by the Congress by including in section 2, ninth, of the Railway Labor Act, provisions requiring the Board to investigate such disputes and issue certifications within 30 days after receipt of applications for service. Although the courts have held this requirement to be directory rather than mandatory, the Board strives to investigate such disputes as promptly as practicable in the interest of promoting stable labor relations on carriers under the act. For these reasons the Board favors keeping its backlog of pending disputes small and thus be in position to assign mediators to newly docketed cases with minimum delay.

During 1947, a total of 209 representation cases was docketed as compared with 176 during the previous year. The steady growth in the number of such cases requiring Board services can readily be studied by reference to table 2. Thus, 186 were docketed during 1945, an average of 149 annually during the period 1940–44 and 108 annually from 1935–39. This increase is due to a number of factors. As knowledge of the provisions of the act have become more wide-

spread groups of employees that had not previously enjoyed collective bargaining rights selected representatives for the first time. Included among such groups are technical engineers, architects, draftsmen, and allied workers, subordinate officials in railroad maintenance and structures departments and airline stewardesses. Another factor in the increased number of representation disputes is the rivalry between labor organizations national in scope and their competition in increasing membership. Rivalry between A. F. of L. and C. I. O. unions is common knowledge and accounts for a substantial part of the increase referred to above.

The Railway Labor Act requires that representation be established by crafts or classes. Inasmuch as more than 1 craft or class is often involved in a single docketed case the number of crafts or classes for which representation is established is higher each year than the num-Thus, table 5 shows that there was a total of 218 separate ber of cases. crafts or classes in the 181 representation cases disposed of during 1947. Just as there was a reduction in the number of cases settled during the year as compared with 1946, so did the number of crafts or classes drop from 256 to 218. Similarly, there were 98,100 employees involved in the 1947 cases as compared to 126,025 employees The abnormally large number of employees during the past 2 years is due to voting shopcraft employees of the Pennsylvania Railroad in both years. In addition there were a number of other representation cases during these past 2 years involving thousands of employees. Prospects for 1948 are for a sharp reduction in the number of employees in such disputes to something near the 1945 total which was 35,097.

Of the 181 representation cases disposed of during 1947, certifications were issued in a total of 154 cases involving a total of 186 crafts or classes. Thus, during the year representation rights were determined by the Board for a total of 94,068 employees. In the remaining 27 cases the applications were withdrawn in 17 and 7 were closed without certification when, following elections, the count of ballots showed an insufficient number of valid votes to constitute a legal majority. The applications were dismissed in 3 cases when investigation developed that the applications covered only a part of the craft or class, or were not supported by a sufficient number of employee authorization cards.

During the fiscal year, 80,075, or 82 percent of the employees involved, cast ballots in representation elections conducted by the Board. This compares with 70 percent participation in 1946, 68 percent participation in 1945. By contrast the participation during the 12-year period 1935—46 was 75 percent. One explanation for the decline in participation during the war years is the large number of ballots mailed to members of the armed forces serving in various parts of the world.

Table 5 below shows, for the 13-year period 1935-47, the number of representation cases, crafts or classes, and employees involved and participating in elections, subdivided by methods of disposition.

2. MAJOR GROUPS OF EMPLOYEES INVOLVED IN REPRESENTATION DISPUTES

Table 6 summarizes representation disputes settled during the

year according to major occupational groups.

As in previous years, train and engine service employees accounted for the largest number of cases while maintenance-of-equipment groups accounted for the largest number of employees. As in 1946, the proportion of such employees is abnormally high, however, due to large representation elections on the Pennsylvania Railroad and the Pullman Company involving 52,000 and 15,000 employees, respectively.

In recognition of the recent increase in the number of representation disputes among airline employees a separate section of table 6 is

devoted to a summary of these cases.

The increase has been both absolute and relative as shown by the fact that during 1945 there were 17 airline representation disputes which constituted only 9 percent of all representation disputes settled during that year. In 1946, the number increased to 24 and the proportion to 11 percent. A still greater increase was registered during 1947 when 23 percent of all representation disputes settled involved airline employees. Thus, it will be seen that the greater interest in collective bargaining among airline employees has reached a point where nearly one-fourth of the Board's activities under section 2, ninth, are utilized in behalf of employees in the airline industry.

During the past year there has been a notable increase in organizing activity among airline clerical and office employees and also among

stewards and stewardesses as evidenced by table 6.

3. TYPES OF REPRESENTATION DISPUTES

For purposes of this report, representation disputes may be divided into two major groups. First, are those between national organizations or local unions on the one hand, and system associations, or unorganized employees. Second, are the interorganizational disputes between two national organizations or two local unions or between a national organization and a local union.

Table 7 shows the distribution of all representation cases disposed of during 1947, by types of organizations, with the number of crafts or classes and employees involved for the 13-year period 1935-47.

Approximately 72 percent of employees involved in representation disputes during 1947 were included in the first category referred to above. In 1946 the ratio was 62 percent but in both years it is abnormally high by reason of the Pennsylvania shopcrafts election. And in 1947 the usual ratio is distorted by reason of the Pullman shop crafts election. Eliminating these two cases from the 1947 total brings the ratio down to 20 percent which compares closely with the 1945 ratio of 24 percent.

As representation of employees by national organizations has approached completion, there has been a shift to cases of the second category. In general, this shift represents competition between national organizations for representation of employees. This competition largely involves disputes between standard railroad labor organizations representing train, engine, and yard employees. The Board has, in past reports, called attention to the undesirability of such contests and has, at various times, attempted to persuade the organizations to discontinue such tactics. Despite these efforts, interunion strife between these organizations has not lessened.

It is important to note, however, that not all interunion strife on the railroads is between these organizations. The movement of C. I. O. organizations and District 50 of the United Mine Workers of America into the railroad industry has accounted for a considerable number of the interunion disputes recorded in table 7. In addition, there is considerable competition between A. F. of L. and C. I. O.

organizations for representation of airline employees.

As in previous years, the data show that the vast majority of employees involved prefer representation by national organizations as against local unions or system associations. Thus, of the 186 crafts or classes for which certifications were issued, 165 were in favor of national organizations. Of this number, 70 were issued in cases where the employees were previously unrepresented, or were represented by a local union or a system association. Certifications for the remaining 95 crafts or classes were issued in cases where national organizations were competing for representation rights.

Table 9 shows the distribution of representation rights among national organizations, local unions, and system associations. Data presented in the table is broken down by crafts or classes, number of employees involved and percentages are shown for all certifications

issued during the fiscal year 1947.

During the year, 154 cases were settled by issuance of certifications. Representatives were determined by elections in 119 of these cases. In the remaining 35 disputes, representatives were determined by

verifying signatures on employee authorization cards.

In the 154 cases, representation rights were established for 186 separate crafts or classes involving a total of 94,068 employees. Of this total, representation rights were acquired for the first time for 6,016 employees, were changed for 41,510 employees, and remained unchanged for 46,542 employees. The percentages in these three categories are 6, 44, and 50, respectively.

National organizations won representation rights for 87 percent of the crafts or classes and 74 percent of the employees in cases in which

certifications were issued.

5. EXTENT AND NATURE OF LABOR REPRESENTATION

Table 10 shows by organizations and crafts or classes the number and mileage of principal rail carriers whose employees were represented by various organizations as of June 30, 1947. The table also includes for comparative purposes the percentages, in previous years, of mileage of carriers on which employees were represented by organizations. The total mileage used in this table is derived by adding the mileages of carriers listed in table 14 on which table 10 is based.

IV. DISPUTES MEDIATED—SETTLEMENTS

During the fiscal year 1947, mediation cases disposed of numbered 239, which was a substantial decrease under the two previous years. This decrease is largely attributable to the great amount of time spent by the Board's mediators in handling the strike dockets of train and engine service organizations, which contained thousands of grievances, time claims, and disputes concerning the proper application or interpretation of agreement rules. The vast majority of cases included in these strike dockets fall in the category of those coming under the jurisdiction of the National Railroad Adjustment Board under section 3 of the act.

Mediation cases docketed during the year totaled 245, a slight decrease under the 260 cases docketed in the previous fiscal year. As of June 30, 1947, 69 open mediation cases remained on the docket, as compared with 63 cases on hand as of June 30, 1946.

1. MEDIATION AND ARBITRATION AGREEMENTS

Of the 239 mediation cases disposed of during the year, 173, or approximately 72 percent, were settled either by mediation agreements, arbitration agreements, or withdrawals prior to, during, or after mediation. Nine disputes were referred to Emergency Boards created under section 10 of the act, and 13 were referred to Panel Emergency Boards set up under the provisions of Executive Order 9172.

The percentage of mediation agreements to total mediation cases for the 13-year period of the Board's operation is slightly over 53. This percentage during the fiscal year 1947 was approximately 44, being a decrease of 16 percent under the previous year. As previously explained, a large part of this decrease may be attributed to the great number of mediator days spent in handling strike dockets of train and engine service organizations which contained many hundreds of grievances, time claims, and other disputes which should come properly before the National Railroad Adjustment Board.

As shown by table 11, above, the two principal categories of questions involved in mediation cases are, first, changes and revisions in

rules, and, second, changes in rates of pay.

During the fiscal year 1947, a total of 18 disputes was settled by arbitration of the issues involved, under the provisions of section 7 of the Railway Labor Act. A résumé of the awards made during the fiscal year is given in chapter V of this report.

2. OTHER ADJUSTMENTS OF MEDIATION CASES

Of the 239 mediation cases disposed of during the past year, 114 were settled by means other than mediation or arbitration agreements. The largest group in this number was 27 cases withdrawn during or after mediation. A total of 63 cases was closed following refusal of either or both parties to submit the controversy to arbitration. Of this number, the employees declined arbitration in 30 cases, and arbitration was refused by the carriers in 23 cases. Both parties declined to arbitrate the issues in 10 cases. Twenty-one cases were withdrawn by the invoking party, and 3 cases were dismissed by Board action.

3. AIRLINE MEDIATION CASES

Included in the total of 239 mediation cases handled during the fiscal year 1947 were 38 cases involving the commercial airlines subject to title II of the Railway Labor Act. This figure represents approximately 16 percent of the total mediation cases handled, and is a slight increase over the 33 airline mediation cases disposed of during the previous year. A large number of the cases handled in 1947 involved either the negotiation of complete new agreements, or major revisions of existing agreements. These cases required prolonged mediation, and it is safe to say that approximately 20 percent of the total of mediator days in the field were spent on airline cases.

During the fiscal year 1947 the Board also handled 39 representation cases among the various crafts or classes of airline employees. With representation of airline employees becoming more complete, an increasingly larger percentage of the Board's time will be occupied

with airline mediation and representation matters.

Prior to the fiscal year covered by this report, a total of 73 airline mediation cases had been handled since title II of the Railway Labor Act was approved on April 10, 1936. The cases disposed of in the fiscal year 1947 bring this total to 111.

V. ARBITRATION AND EMERGENCY BOARDS

1. ARBITRATION BOARDS

In disputes where the Board or its representatives have been unable to effect a settlement through mediation, its next duty under the Railway Labor Act is to use its best efforts to induce the parties to submit their controversies to arbitration under the provisions of section 7 of the act. Acceptance of arbitration under the Railway Labor Act is not compulsory with the parties to such disputes. However, the Board feels that the offer of arbitration should not be perfunctory, but practically the same effort should be made by its representatives to secure an arbitration agreement as is made during mediation proceedings. Arbitration under section 7 of the Railway Labor Act has the additional advantage of providing a definite and legally enforceable decision under which both parties to the dispute may operate in the future.

During the fiscal year 1947, 20 arbitration agreements were consummated, making a total of 88 agreements to arbitrate which have been brought about by the Board's efforts during the 13-year period of its history.

Awards made by arbitration boards during the 1947 fiscal year are briefly summarized below:

The question in dispute was the employees' proposal to cancel rule 16 of the working agreement between the parties effective February 1, 1936, which provides that if any single female employee working under the provisions of such rule becomes married, she would immediately lose all seniority rating. Arbitration hearings were commenced in Duluth, Minn., on September 4, 1946, and the award was dated September 6, 1946. The abritration board decided that the rule in question should be eliminated from the working agreement.

The questions in dispute comprised requested increases in rates of pay and various changes in working conditions. Arbitration hearings were commenced in Los Angeles on July 12, 1946, and the award was dated July 26, 1946. In its award the arbitration board granted certain increases in rates of pay and some of the changes in working rules which had been requested by the employees.

Members of the arbitration board were Judge Sidney St. F. Thaxter, of Portland, Maine; Mr. L. B. Glacy, comptroller, Boston & Maine Railroad, of Boston, Mass. The party arbitrators selected by the organization and the carrier being unable to agree upon the neutral member, the National Mediation Board designated Judge Sidney St. F. Thaxter as the neutral arbitrator and he was elected chairman of the board.

The question in dispute was a request of the organization that the provisions of a memorandum agreement dated May 21, 1942, respecting the employment and the retention in employment of married women be canceled. Arbitration hearings were commenced in Boston, Mass., on January 10, 1947, and the award was dated January 27, 1947. In its award the arbitration board decided that the memorandum agreement in question should be canceled.

The questions in dispute involved the terms of a number of changes in the rules governing working conditions of stock clerks employed by American Airlines, Inc. Hearings were commenced in New York, N. Y., on July 25, 1946, and the award was rendered on August 9, 1946. In its award, the arbitration board stipulated a number of changes in the then existing working rules covering the above-named class of employees.

Gibbs was appointed by the National Mediation Board as the neutral member and he was elected to act as chairman of the arbitration board.

The question in dispute involved a request by the employees that all work performed on Sundays and certain designated holidays be paid for at the rate of time and one-half. Hearings commenced in Dallas, Tex., on December 16, 1946, and the award was rendered on December 24, 1946. In its award the arbitration board denied the change in the Sunday and holiday rule as requested by the employees.

Y., on October 24, 1946, and the award was rendered on November 4, 1946. In its award the arbitration board granted certain increases in rates of pay for flight pursers and stewardesses employed by American Overseas Airlines, Inc., and granted certain of the rules changes requested by the employees.

The question in dispute involved a request on the part of the employees that a memorandum of agreement dated January 2, 1943, providing that it was not necessary to use an employee represented by the organization with a hostler crew in making hostling movements be abrogated. Hearings were commenced in Denver, Colo., on December 12, 1946, and the award of the board was rendered on December 16, 1946. In its award the arbitration board denied the request of the employees.

The questions in dispute were whether train dispatchers shall direct the movement of trains in centralized traffic controlled territories, when the control board is not located at a point where train dispatchers are employed, by the issuance of instructions to the centralized traffic control operators arranging meeting points, passing and working movements of trains; also whether train dispatchers shall maintain records showing location of all trains at all stations shown on the centralized traffic control machine. Hearings commenced in Denver, Colo., on February 3, 1947, and the board rendered its award on February 7, 1947. In its award the arbitration board denied the two requests of the employees.

The questions in dispute included rates of compensation for first pilots flying Douglas Skymaster aircraft in domestic and international service, rates of compensation of first pilots for flying Lockheed Constellation aircraft in domestic and international service, rates of copilots for flying both types of equipment in both types of service; additional compensation for copilots in international operation who qualify as navigators; and other rules governing working conditions and pay allowances of the pilot personnel. Hearings were commenced in Chicago, Ill., on January 3, 1947, and the board rendered its award on January 22, 1947. In its award the arbitration board allowed certain increases in compensation of pilots and copilots assigned to the services above mentioned and also prescribed various rules covering the questions which were submitted to it.

The questions in dispute involved requested pay increases for flight engineers and assistant flight engineers, also certain amendments to rules and working conditions requested by the organization. Arbitration hearings were commenced in New York City on December 16, 1946, and the award was dated January 7, 1947. In its award the arbitration board granted certain increases in pay for the employees involved and a part of the changes in rules which had been requested by the organization.

After the award was issued, a dispute arose between the parties concerning the proper interpretation of paragraphs 14 (a) and (c) of the award. The arbitration board was reconvened and met in New York City on March 31, 1947, to interpret the above provisions. The interpretation was made on April 1, 1947, and sustained the contention of the employee representatives in connection with the application of terminal vacation pay allowances.

Arbitration hearings commenced in Bluefield, W. Va., on February 18, 1947, and the award was dated February 20, 1947. In its award the Arbitration Board decided that the rates of pay of power directors should be increased in the sum of \$34.90 per month effective September 5, 1946.

Members of the arbitration board were Mr. Sidney L. Cahn, attorney, New York, N. Y.; Mr. Maurice H. Forge, international vice president, Transport Workers Union of America, C. I. O., New York, N. Y.; and Mr. Emil F. Jazz, personnel director, American Overseas Airlines, Inc., New York, N. Y. The party members being unable to agree upon a neutral, the National Mediation Board appointed Mr. Sidney L. Cahn as the neutral member and he was elected chairman of the board.

The questions involved included a request for an increase in rates of pay for the employees represented by the organization, as well as various changes in rules and working conditions. Arbitration hearings were commenced in New York City on February 27, 1947, and the award was dated March 19, 1947. In its award the arbitration board granted certain increases in rates of pay to employees involved and also outlined the terms of a number of rules which had been submitted to it for decision.

Case A-2405, Arb. 83

International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers, C. I. O.

and

Bingham & Garfield Railway Co.

Members of the arbitration board were Dr. William H. Leary, dean of law school, University of Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah; Mr. D. S. Walker, representing the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers, C. I. O., Salt Lake City, Utah; and Mr. Eugene Culleton, assistant superintendent, Bingham & Garfield Ry. Co., Magna, Utah. The party members designated Dr. William H. Leary as the neutral member and chairman of the board.

The questions submitted to arbitration included an increase in rates of pay for trackmen, including laborers and helpers, in the track department employed by the carrier. Arbitration hearings were

commenced in Salt Lake City on May 9, 1947, and the award was dated June 6, 1947. In its award the arbitration board granted the pay increases requested by the representatives of the employees involved.

Case -, Arb. 84

Transport Workers Union of America, C. I. O.

and

American Airlines, Inc.

Members of the arbitration board were Mr. Frank M. Swacker, attorney, of New York, N. Y.; Mr. Maurice H. Forge, international vice president, Transport Workers Union of America, C. I. O., New York, N. Y.; and Mr. Lee J. Robison, Director of Labor Relations, American Airlines, Inc., New York, N. Y. The party members being unable to agree upon a neutral, the National Mediation Board appointed Mr. Frank M. Swacker as the neutral member and he was elected as chairman of the board.

The question involved in this dispute was an increase in rates of pay for stock clerks and senior stock clerks represented by the organi-This question had not been mediated under the terms of the Railway Labor Act. However, the National Mediation Board agreed to assume expense of the arbitration proceedings under section 7 of the Railway Labor Act in accordance with the ruling rendered by the Comptroller General of the United States under date of September 2, This ruling of the Comptroller General stated that in such instances where the National Mediation Board has determined that there has been a substantial compliance with the provisions of the Railway Labor Act requiring that the parties make proper efforts to settle their disputes in direct negotiations, this Board by administrative action may assume the expense of arbitration proceedings where there has been no mediation. The National Mediation Board feels that the process of mediation should not be bypassed by the parties to such disputes under ordinary conditions and that probably such disputes could be settled in mediation if it were invoked without the necessity of resorting to arbitration. However, in this particular instance, since the Board had made a commitment to assume such expense, the Comptroller General found such action not to be illegal. The arbitration proceedings were considered as having been conducted under section 7 of the Railway Labor Act.

Arbitration proceedings were commenced in New York City on May 8, 1947, and the award was dated May 13, 1947. A portion of the wage increase demanded by the organization was awarded to

the employees involved.

Case A-2517, Arb. 85

Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen

and

The Monongahela Connecting R. R. Co.

Members of the arbitration board were Hon. Leverett Edwards, attorney, of Oklahoma City, Okla.; Mr. U. D. Hartman, general chairman, Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, Pennsylvania Railroad Lines, Western Region, Richmond, Ind.; and Mr. C. A. Miller, general counsel, American Short Line Railroad Association, Washington, D. C. The party members designated Hon. Leverett Edwards as the neutral member and he was elected as chairman of the board.

The question involved in this dispute was a request of the yardmen (conductors and brakemen) represented by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen for 2 weeks vacation with pay. Arbitration hearings commenced in Pittsburgh, Pa., on May 26, 1947, and the award was rendered on May 29, 1947. In its award the board decided that annual vacations of 6 consecutive work days with pay will be granted to yardmen who render compensated service for not less than 160 days during the preceding calendar year. Further, that annual vacations with pay of 9 and 12 consecutive work days will be granted such employees after 2 or 3 years of continuous service, respectively.

Flight Communications Officers Association

and

American Overseas Airlines, Inc.

Members of the arbitration board were Mr. Maurice J. Kaplan, attorney, New York, N. Y.; Mr. T. H. Oppegard, president, Flight Communications Officers Association, New York, N. Y.; and Mr. B. J. Bergeson, representing American Overseas Airlines, Inc., New York, N. Y. The party members being unable to agree upon a neutral, the National Mediation Board appointed Mr. Maurice J. Kaplan as the neutral member and he was elected as chairman of the board.

This arbitration board was constituted by direct negotiations between the parties in a manner similar to that outlined above in Arb. 84, which involved the Transport Workers Union of America, C. I. O., and American Airlines, Inc. A similar commitment had been made to the parties in Arb. 87 and the expenses of this arbitration board were also assumed by the National Mediation Board.

The questions in dispute comprised requested increases in rates of pay for employees represented by the organization, also a number of changes in rules and working conditions. Arbitration hearings were held in New York City and the award was dated June 25, 1947. In its award the arbitration board granted certain pay increases and various changes in rules and working conditions.

and

Pan American Airways, Inc.

Members of the arbitration board were Mr. Sidney L. Cahn, attorney, New York, N. Y.; Mr. J. C. McGlon, international representative, International Association of Machinists, Washington, D. C.; and Mr. W. Overton Snyder, representing Pan American Airways, Inc., Miami, Fla. The party members selected Mr. Sidney L. Cahn as the neutral member and he was elected chairman of the board.

The question in dispute involved a request for an increase in pay for stock clerks represented by the organization, also the establishment of a longevity pay plan. Arbitration hearings were commenced in Long Island City, N. Y., on June 9, 1947, and the award was rendered on June 13, 1947. In its award the arbitration board granted an increase of 16 cents per hour to the employees employed and denied the request for the longevity pay plan.

2. EMERGENCY BOARDS—SECTION 10, RAILWAY LABOR ACT

In the event a dispute is not disposed of and a situation arises which, in the judgment of the Mediation Board, threatens substantially to interrupt interstate commerce to a degree such as to deprive a section of the country of essential transportation service, the Board, under section 10 of the act, is required to notify the President, who may, in his discretion, create a special board to investigate the dispute and make a report thereon within 30 days. For 30 days after such a special board makes its report to the President, no change, except by agreement, may be made by the parties to the controversy in the conditions out of which the dispute arose. Boards of this kind are referred to as emergency boards.

Nine such emergency boards were created by the President under section 10 of the Railway Labor Act during the fiscal year 1947.

A summary of the reports of these boards follows:

An Executive order of the President dated May 7, 1946, resulted in the appoint-An executive order of the President dated May 7, 1946, resulted in the appointment of a board composed of Hon. George E. Bushnell, judge, Supreme Court of Michigan, Detroit, Mich.; Dr. Wm. M. Leiserson, director, Labor Organization Study, John Hopkins University, Washington, D. C.; and Dr. John A. Lapp, industrial relations consultant, Chicago, Ill.

The Board selected Judge Bushnell as chairman. Public hearings were held in New York, N. Y., beginning May 17, 1946, and concluding June 19, 1946. The Board's report to the President was dated July 8, 1946.

Although the emergency board in this case did not file its report to the President until July 8, 1946, a complete description of the questions involved in the disputes and the recommendations of the emergency board were carried in this Board's Twelfth Annual Report on pages 49 and 50.

> Case A-2334, Emergency Board No. 38 International Association of Machinists

and

Northwest Airlines, Inc.

An Executive order of the President dated July 3, 1946, resulted in the appointment of an emergency board composed of Mr. Frank M. Swacker, attorney, New York City, N. Y.; Dr. John A. Lapp, industrial relations consultant, Chicago, Ill.; Colonel Grady Lewis, attorney, Washington, D. C.

The Board selected Mr. Frank M. Swacker as chairman. Public hearings were held in St. Paul, Minn., beginning on July 15, 1946, and concluded its hearings on July 31, 1946. Its report to the President was dated August 7, 1946.

The questions in dispute resulted from the efforts of the International Association of Machinists to negotiate a working agreement with the Northwest Airlines, Inc., after having been certified by the National Mediation Board as representing the airline mechanics in the service of that company. The dispute was mediated by the National Mediation Board but it was unable to bring the parties to an agreement. Prior to the request for the services of the National Mediation Board, a work stoppage of 1 day occurred on the carrier. The questions in dispute included rules covering recall to service, vacations, sick leave, longevity pay, premium payments for aircraft and engine licenses, night shift premiums, payment for test flights, severance pay, free transportation, and wage rates.

In its report, the board recommended that no changes be made in the vacation practice of the carrier, which allowed 2 weeks' vacation per year after 1 year's service. It also recommended no change in the current sick-leave allowance. No increase was recommended in the longevity pay allowance, nor in the premiums being paid for mechanics holding aircraft and engine licenses. A shift premium of 4 and 6 cents per hour was recommended for the second and third shifts, respectively. The request of the employees for test flight bonus payment was denied. It was further recommended that the company's current practice of 2 weeks' notice or 2 weeks' severance pay be incorporated as a term of the working agreement. The board recommended against a rule providing for the issuance of free transportation. The employees had requested a wage increase averaging about 18 percent, or approximately 20 cents per hour. under the wage stabilization policy in effect at that time, the emergency board felt unable to make any recommendation for an increase in wages. The carrier also had made certain proposals for rules changes, which were covered by recommendations in the report of the emergency board.

Case A-2350, Emergency Board No. 39

Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen

and

The Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad Co.

An Executive order of the President dated July 10, 1946, resulted in the appointment of an emergency board composed of Judge Roger I. McDonough, of the Supreme Court of Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah; Judge John W. Yeager, of the Supreme Court of Nebraska, Lincoln, Nebr.; and Mr. Floyd McGown of Boerne, Tex.

The board selected Judge Yeager as chairman. Public hearings were held in Denver, Colo., commencing on July 17, 1946, and ending August 3, 1946. The board's report to the President was dated August 14, 1946.

The questions in dispute included 23 items which had been a part of a strike ballot spread by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen among the employees of the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad Co. represented by that organization. In addition to these 23 items, 10 other cases were submitted to the emergency board which had not been included in the strike ballot. All of these 33 items covered matters which are properly referable to the First Division of the National Railroad Adjustment Board under the provisions of section 3 of the Railway Labor Act. The Brotherhood stated they were not submitted to the First Division for the reason that that division had ceased to function in 1945 for all practical purposes and that there was a great deal of dissatisfaction and unrest among the employees due to

delay in settlement or opportunity for adjudication of these cases. Notwithstanding the jurisdiction given the Adjustment Board by section 3 of the Railway Labor Act, the emergency board felt called upon to consider and make recommendations in each of these 33 The emergency board recommended that the carrier allow the employees' contentions in the majority of these items.

An Executive order of the President dated July 27, 1946, resulted in the appointment of a board composed of Dr. I. L. Sharfman, professor of economics, University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Mich.; Judge Robert G. Simmons, Supreme Court of Nebraska, Lincoln, Nebr.; and Dr. Walton H. Hamilton of Yale Law

School, New Haven, Conn.
The board selected Dr. Sharfman as chairman. Public hearings were held in Chicago, Ill., commencing August 5, 1946, and concluding on August 14, 1946. The board's report to the President was dated August 23, 1946.

The question in dispute involved proper application of a wage increase of 18½ cents per hour, or \$1.48 per basic day, to the wage rates of Pullman conductors represented by the organization. specific question was whether this increase should be applied on a basis of 225 hours' service per month, which is the basic number of credited hours as carried in the contract between the Pullman Co. and the Order of Railway Conductors, or whether it should be applied on the basis of 240 hours per month, that is, 8 hours for each of the 30 days generally regarded as constituting a work month. full consideration of the position of each party, the emergency board concluded that the increase should be applied on the basis of 240 hours per service month in accordance with the demands of the organization.

Case A-2389, Emergency Board No. 41

Long Island Railroad Co.

An Executive order of the President dated August 22, 1946, resulted in the An Executive order of the President dated August 22, 1946, resulted in the appointment of an emergency board composed of Mr. Frank M. Swacker, attorney, New York, N. Y.; Hon. H. Nathan Swaim, former judge of the Supreme Court of Indiana, Indianapolis, Ind.; and Mr. Leverett Edwards, attorney, Oklahoma City, Okla.

The board selected Mr. Frank M. Swacker as chairman. Public hearings were commenced in New York City on September 9, 1946, and were concluded on September 20, 1946. The report of the board to the President was dated October 11, 1946.

11, 1946.

The dispute covered by this case involved changes in both rates of pay and working conditions requested by the organization, which represented trainmen employed by the Long Island Railroad Co. The principal issues involved in the dispute included rules governing short turn-around service, or the so-called 8-within-10-hour provisions, and the payment of overtime at straight time rates rather than at time and one-half as demanded.

After the conclusion of testimony taken by the emergency board, it undertook mediation between the parties as a result of which direct negotiations were resumed under the auspices of the emergency These efforts resulted in complete agreement and the signing of a contract disposing of the entire controversy.

Case A-2276, Emergency Board No. 42

International Association of Machinists

and

The Utah Idaho Central Railroad Corp.

An Executive order of the President dated September 23, 1946, resulted in the appointment of a board composed of Judge Richard F. Mitchell of the Supreme Court of Iowa, Fort Dodge, Iowa; Judge Norris C. Bakke of the Supreme Court of Colorado, Denver, Colo.; and Hon. Otto S. Beyer, former member of the National Mediation Board, Washington, D. C.

The board selected Judge Mitchell as chairman. Public hearings were held in Ogden, Utah, commencing on October 2, 1946, and concluding on October 8, 1946. The board's report to the President was dated October 11, 1946.

The issue involved was the request of the International Association of Machinists for an increase in pay for the employees of the carrier represented by that organization. During the course of the hearings conducted by the board, an agreement was reached between the parties which resulted in a settlement of the dispute, making a formal report and recommendation on the part of the emergency board unnecessary.

Case A-2386, Emergency Board No. 43

15 Cooperating Railway Labor Organizations (nonoperating)

Atlanta & St. Andrews Bay Railway Co., et al.

An Executive order signed by the President on October 25, 1946, resulted in the appointment of a Board composed of Judge James H. Wolfe, Supreme Court of Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah; Prof. Robert E. Stone, Syracuse University, Syracuse, N. Y.; and Mr. Floyd McGown of Boerne, Tex.

Judge Wolfe was selected by the board as chairman. Public hearings were commenced in Chicago, Ill., on October 31, 1946, to and including November 19, 1946. The Board's propert to the President was dated December 4, 1946.

The Board's report to the President was dated December 4, 1946.

The issue involved in this case was the application of the general wage increase of 18½ cents per hour, which was made the so-called national pattern resulting from the 1946 wage settlements, to employees of 20 short-line railroads represented by various of the 15 cooperating railway labor organizations (nonoperating). In the course of its hearings, the emergency board afforded each carrier involved in this dispute the opportunity of presenting its case separately, and in the board's report, a separate recommendation was made respecting each of the 20 carriers. In practically every instance, the carriers involved in this dispute pleaded inability to pay the 18½ cents increase under the national pattern. However, in its report, the emergency board recommended in the case of practically all of these 20 carriers involved that they adhere to the national pattern and place the 18%-cent increase in effect as demanded by the employees. In one or two instances, the board recommended that special operating and financial conditions of the carrier be taken into consideration in further negotiations to be conducted between employees and carriers.

Case A-2382, Emergency Board No. 44

Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen

Barre & Chelsea Railroad Co. and St. Johnsbury & Lake Champlain Railroad Co.

An Executive order of the President dated November 6, 1946, resulted in the appointment of a board composed of Judge James H. Wolfe, Supreme Court of Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah; Prof. Robert E. Stone, Syracuse University, Syracuse, N. Y.; and Mr. Floyd McGown of Boerne, Tex.

The board selected Judge Wolfe as chairman. Public hearings were commenced in Chicago, Ill., on November 20, 1946, and were concluded on the same date. The board's report was made to the President on December 4, 1946.

The dispute in this case involved the application of a wage increase of 18½ cents per hour to the train and engine service employees of the two carriers named above, in accordance with the national pattern established by the settlement made on May 25, 1946, between the carriers represented by the three Regional Conference Committees and the respective Brotherhoods. The application of this increase to the employees of the two carriers involved in this case was handled in mediation without effecting a settlement, and a strike occurred among the employees during the handling given by the National Mediation Board. The two carriers pleaded inability to pay the amount of increase mentioned above. However, after an exhaustive investigation of the financial situation existing on these two properties, the emergency board recommended that the full amount of the 18½ cents increase be applied in accordance with the dates of the application in the national settlement of May 25, 1946.

Cases A-2455, 2456, 2457, and 2458; Emergency Board No. 45

National Maritime Union (C. I. O.)

Ann Arbor Railroad Co., Grand Trunk Western Railroad Co., Pere Marquette Railway Co., Wabash Railroad Co.

An Executive order of the President dated March 28, 1947, resulted in the appointment of a board consisting of Mr. Frank M. Swacker, attorney, New York, N. Y.; Hon. Harry H. Schwartz, former member of the National Mediation Board, Washington, D. C.; and Dr. Hugh B. Fouke of Youngstown, Ohio.

The board selected Mr. Swacker as chairman. Public hearings were held in Detroit, Mich., commencing April 11, 1947, and continued through April 18, 1947. The board's report to the President was dated April 21, 1947.

The questions in dispute involved changes proposed by the National Maritime Union in rates of pay for deck and engine personnel and employees in the stewards' department of the car-ferry operations of the four carriers crossing Lake Michigan. After conclusion of the testimony in hearings on April 18, 1947, the Emergency Board undertook mediation of the dispute and their efforts resulted in agreements between the respective carriers and the National Maritime Union under which certain increases were granted to the employees involved in the dispute. The emergency board, therefore, made no formal recommendations in this case.

3. EMERGENCY BOARDS—NATIONAL RAILWAY LABOR PANEL

As noted in earlier annual reports of the Board (for the fiscal years 1942, 1943, 1944, 1945, and 1946), the National Railway Labor Panel was created under authority of Executive Order 9172 ¹ (May 22, 1942), to supplement the procedures under section 10 of the Railway Labor Act during the period of wartime emergency by making available the services of panel emergency boards in dispute cases wherein the employee organizations refrain from taking strike votes or resorting to strikes after the parties have followed the provisions of sections 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of the Railway Labor Act and have not succeeded in resolving their disputes. Executive Order 9299 ² (February 4, 1943), assigned to the chairman of the panel responsibility for determining the permissibility, under the stabilization program, of nondisputed wage or salary adjustments proposed "as a result of voluntary agreement, collective bargaining, conciliation, arbitration, or otherwise."

Under section 202 of the Stabilization Extension Act of 1944 (Public Law 383, 78th Cong.) Arbitration and Emergency Boards, in dispute cases affecting wage or salary payments, "as a prerequisite to effecting or recommending a settlement of any such dispute," are required to make "a specific finding and certification that the changes proposed by such settlement or recommended settlement are consistent with such standards as may be then in effect, established by or pursuant to law, for the purpose of controlling inflationary tendencies." The act further provides that such findings and certifications shall be conclusive, and that "it shall be lawful for the employees and carriers, by agreement, to put into effect the changes proposed by the settlement or recommended settlement with respect to which such findings and certification were made."

Executive Order 9599 (August 18, 1945), further defined, for the reconversion period, the authority of officials charged with the settlement of labor disputes by stating that "labor disputes which would interfere with effective transition to a peacetime economy are disputes which interrupt work contributing to the effective prosecution of the

war."

Executive Order 9651 (October 30, 1945), amended Executive Order 9599, providing for assistance to expand production and continued stabilization of the national economy during the transition from war to peace, and for the orderly modification of wartime controls over prices, wages, materials, and facilities.

Executive Order 9697 (February 14, 1946), provided for the continued stabilization of the national economy during the transition

from war to peace.

On November 1, 1946, Executive Order 9801 was issued removing wage and salary controls adopted pursuant to the Stabilization Act of 1942.

Note.—On August 11, 1947, the President issued Executive Order 9883, which revoked Executive Order No. 9172 of May 22, 1942, establishing a panel for the creation of Emergency Boards for the adjustment of railway labor disputes, since it appears that the procedures available under the Railway Labor Act are

now adequate for the handling and adjustment of such disputes. (This will appear in the annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1948.)

During the fiscal year 1947, 13 separate emergency boards and 1 reconvened emergency board were designated by the chairman of the National Railway Labor Panel from among the persons appointed to the panel by the President. All of these boards reported prior to June 30, 1947, the end of the fiscal year. No provision was made in the appropriations for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 1947, to continue the activities of the panel.

Ware, was appointed to investigate a dispute between the Norfolk Southern Railway Co. and the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employes, concerning payment of time and one-half for all work in excess of 8 hours per day. The board elected Herbert B. Rudolph as its chairman and conducted its hearings in Raleigh, N. C.,

starting July 9, 1946.
On July 10, 1946, the board reported that its mediatory services had resulted in agreement between the parties, which agreement provided that commencing September 1, 1946, time worked in excess of 8 hours on any 1 day shall be paid for at the rate of time and one-half on the minute basis.

National Mediation Board Cases A-2311, A-2312, A-2313, A-2314, and A-2315

The Chicago, Indianapolis & Louisville Railway; the Lehigh Valley Railroad; The Delaware & Hudson Railroad; The Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad Co.; and The Norfolk Southern Railway Co.

The Order of Railroad Telegraphers

On July 10, 1946, James H. Wolfe, Edwin E. Witte, and Robert Wickliffe Woolley were appointed members of an emergency board to investigate dispute between the organization and five carriers. The Board elected James H. Wolfe as its chairman and conducted its hearings in Washington, D. C., beginning July 16, 1946.

On July 29, 1946, the board in its report, recommended as the basis for settlement of disputes between the telegraphers' organization and the five railroads, adoption of a rest-day rule for railroad telegrapher personnel identical in substance with that agreed upon in mediation on July 13, 1945, between railroads represented by the Southeastern and Wesvern Carriers' Conference Committees and The Order of Railroad Telegraphers.

and

The Hotel and Restaurant Employees' International Alliance and Bartenders' International League of America

An emergency board, composed of Robert Wickliffe Woolley, Norman J Ware and John A. Lapp, was appointed on September 18, 1946, to investigate a dispute between the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Co. and the Hotel and Restaurant Employees' International Alliance and Bartenders' International

League of America, involving request for time and one-half for overtime.

The board elected Robert Wickliffe Woolley as its chairman and conducted its hearings at Wilmington, N. C., beginning September 26, 1947.

In its report, dated October 7, 1946, the board recommended that the existing overtime rule be amended so as to require the payment of time and one-half after 240 hours per month, and that the rule to be adopted should conform to the present practice on the other railroads which now pay punitive overtime.

Duluth, Missabe & Iron Range Railway Co.

Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employes

On November 19, 1946, Norman J. Ware, Eugene L. Padberg and John A. Fitch were designated to serve as an emergency board to investigate unresolved issues between the carrier and the organization.

The board elected Norman J. Ware as chairman and conducted its hearings in

Duluth, Minn., beginning November 25, 1946.

In its report, dated December 8, 1946, the board recommended exemption of certain positions requiring special qualifications from the seniority rules, and, in some instances, from the overtine rules of the collective agreement between the Duluth, Missabe & Iron Range Railway Co. and the Brotherhood of Railway Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express & Station Employes. With respect to nine other disputed rules of the contract, the board recommended adoption of modifications to which the parties had tentatively agreed in earlier negotiations or during the board's proceedings.

Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employes

On November 26, 1946, an emergency board comprising Robert Wickliffe Woolley, James P. Hughes, and Leif Erickson, was appointed to hear a dispute, concerning request of the employees for an increase in rates of pay, between the Northeast Airlines, Inc., and the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employes.

The board elected Robert Wickliffe Woolley as its chairman and conducted hearings in Boston, Mass., beginning December 2, 1946.

On December 17, 1946, the board recommended a general wage increase of 22 cents per hour, retroactive to October 1, 1946, for the clerical employees of Northeast Airlines, based upon the increased cost of living, comparative wage rates, and the high turn-over in clerical personnel of the carrier.

National Mediation Board Case A-1835

Charleston & Western Carolina Railway Co.

and

Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employes

On December 11, 1946, an emergency board consisting of John W. Yeager, John A. Lapp and John A. Fitch, was appointed to consider the issues involved in a dispute between the Charleston and Western Carolina Railway Company and the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employes. The Brotherhood gave the carrier notice of its intention to seek a change and modification of three existing rules—the scope rule, the seniority district rule, and the Sunday and holiday work rule—and in addition. proposed a new rule which would govern the rights of the parties in the case of absence from work of employees on account of sickness.

The board elected John W. Yeager as its chairman and conducted hearings in Augusta, Georgia, starting on December 13, 1946.

In its report of December 23, 1946, the board recommended certain modifica-

tions in the contract definition of seniority districts; and denied the Brother-hood's proposal that only six clerical positions on the Company be excluded from the seniority provisions of the contract between the parties. The board also recommended denial of the Brotherhood's demand that the contract contain a new rule providing compensation for employees absent from work because of illness, but, recommended that, with respect to short-time sickness, the parties negotiate on the Brotherhood's proposal that employees absent from work because of sickness would not have their pay deducted if fellow employees kept up the work or the work could be reasonably deferred.

The board elected Frank M. Swacker as chairman and conducted hearings in

Rutland, Vermont, beginning February 3, 1947.
In its report of February 13, 1947, the board recommended that the vacation question be left in abeyance until the wage question may be determined.

On February 25, 1947, H. H. Schwartz, Norman J. Ware and Eugene L. Padberg were appointed members of an emergency board to investigate a dispute

beig were appointed members of an emergency board to investigate a dispute involving an upward adjustment in rates of pay of employees in the Mail and Baggage Department at Chicago.

The board elected H. H. Schwartz as its chairman and conducted hearings in Chicago, Ill., commencing on March 3, 1947.

On March 17, 1947, the board recommended some additional differential pay for those employees who supervise the work of mail and baggage handlers. The beard denied the correction to acceptable appropriate to the correction of the c board denied the carrier's request to establish apprentice or step-up rates in positions of mail and baggage handlers and tractor operators.

Louisville & Nashville Railroad Co.

American Train Dispatchers Association

On March 24, 1947, an emergency board comprising Ernest M. Tipton, John A. Fitch and Walter Gilkyson, was appointed to investigate a dispute between the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Co. and the American Train Dispatchers Association. The unadjusted dispute was a proposal on the part of the employees to change the scope rule or article 1 of the agreement between the employees and the carrier dated March 4, 1936, to include chief, night chief, and assistant chief dispatchers.

The board elected Ernest M. Tipton as chairman and conducted hearings in

Louisville, Ky., beginning March 31, 1947.
In its report, dated April 10, 1947, the board recommended that the scope rule, proposed by the employees to include chief and night chief dispatchers, be adopted.

Louisville & Nashville Railroad Co.

and

American Train Dispatchers Association

On June 10, 1947, the emergency board which reported its findings on April 10, 1947, on the unadjusted dispute between the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Co. and American Train Dispatchers Association, was reconvened in Louisville, Ky., on June 18, 1947.

The two questions submitted to the board for interpretation arose from a difference of opinion with respect to the exact meaning of a paragraph in the

board's report of April 10.
On June 19, 1947, the reconvened board interpreted its previous report to the effect that all chief, night chief and assistant chief dispatchers should be covered by all rules of the present agreement except that the carrier should have the privilege of filling the positions of chief dispatchers without regard to the seniority rule. The title "chief dispatcher" applies to day chief dispatchers only.

The board elected H. H. Schwartz as its chairman and conducted hearings in

Mobile, Ala., beginning June 5, 1947.

In its report of June 14, 1947, the board unable to compose differences in mediation, recommended that in all cases where three shifts were worked, present lower wage of the second and third shift be advanced to the wage now paid for the first shift, and that all other requests of the union be denied.

Railroad Yardmasters of America

An emergency board composed of Robert Wickliffe Woolley, Norman J. Warc, and James P. Hughes, was appointed on June 9, 1947, to hear a dispute between the Missouri Pacific Railroad Co. and Railroad Yardmasters of America.

The board elected Robert Wickliffe Woolley as chairman and conducted its

hearings in St. Louis, Mo., beginning June 16, 1947.

The dispute considered by the board included requests from the organization for recognition of its right to represent general yardmasters, payment of time and one-half for service performed on Sunday and certain legal holidays, and a sicklist rule.

On June 24, 1947, the board reported that as a result of its mediatory efforts, an agreement was reached between the parties, disposing of all items in dispute. The carrier instituted a practice of granting general yardmasters 1 day off per week, and 2 weeks' annual vacation with pay, but such practice was not a matter of agreement with the organization.

National Mediation Board Case A-2503

Florida East Coast Railway Co.

International Association of Railway Employees

An emergency board, composed of H. H. Schwartz, John W. Yeager, and John A. Lapp, was appointed on June 10, 1947, to investigate an unadjusted dispute between the Florida East Coast Railway Co. and the International Association of Railway Employees. This organization and its predecessor organization of colored firemen on this railway were not parties to the 1946 national arbitration proceedings resulting in a 16-cent increased wage of the 15 nonoperating railroad unions, nor in the further 21/2-cent increase later granted by the In August 1946, the present organization requested the carrier to The railway countered with a give the 18½-cent increase to its employees. request that certain rules of the existing agreement be clarified.

The board elected H. H. Schwartz as its chairman and conducted hearings in

St. Augustine, Fla., commencing June 16, 1947.
On June 21, 1947, the board reported that its mediatory services had resulted in agreement between the parties composing all disputes, the carrier granting the full 181/2 cents to all colored firemen, retroactive to October 1, 1946.

National Mediation Board Case A-2533 Missouri Pacific Railroad Co.

and

American Train Dispatchers Association

On June 23, 1947, an emergency board, consisting of Robert Wickliffe Woolley, Norman J. Ware, and James P. Hughes, was appointed to hear a dispute between the Missouri Pacific Railroad Co. and American Train Dispatchers Association. This dispute included a request from the organization to place division trainmasters, which title is given positions customarily designated as chief dispatchers on other roads, under the full coverage of the agreement held by the American Train Dispatchers Association.

The board elected Robert Wickliffe Woolley as chairman and conducted hear-

ings in St. Louis, Mo., beginning June 25, 1947.

In its report of June 30, 1947, the board denied the request of the organization but recommended that the positions of division trainmaster (chief dispatcher) be continued under a separate agreement between the parties limiting the hours of service to 8 hours per day, providing for 1 rest day per week, 12 days' vacation with pay per year, and further providing that these positions shall be filled from the ranks of train dispatchers.

VI. WAGE AND RULE AGREEMENTS

The Railway Labor Act places upon both the carriers and their employees the duty of exerting every reasonable effort to make and maintain agreements governing rates of pay, rules, and working conditions. The number of such agreements in existence indicates the wide extent to which this policy of the act has become effective on both rail and air carriers.

1. AGREEMENTS COVERING RATES OF PAY, RULES, AND WORKING CONDITIONS

Under section 5, third (e), all carriers subject to the Railway Labor Act are required to file with the National Mediation Board copies of all their agreements with employee representatives governing rates of pay, rules, and working conditions. As of June 30, 1947, there was on file with this Board a total of 4,937 such agreements, or an increase of 104 new agreements received during the year. Of this increase, 29 new agreements cover air line employees and the remainder are applicable to railroad and express employees. Table 12 shows for the 13-year period 1935–47 the number of agreements filed with the Board, subdivided by classes of carriers, and by types of labor organizations.

In addition to the formal agreements recorded in table 12, the Board also receives each year many supplemental agreements and amendments to existing agreements. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1947, a total of 1,234 such revisions and supplements was filed with the Board. Of this total, 1,205 were revised or amended agreements.

Seven of the supplemental agreements received during the year provided for the transfer of existing agreements from one organization to another, after changes in employee representation. Adding the 1,234 revised and supplemental agreements to the 104 new basic agreements produces a total of 1,338 agreements of all types received in the Board's office during the fiscal year 1947.

2. CLASSES OF EMPLOYEES COVERED BY AGREEMENTS

Table 13 shows the extent of coverage by collective bargaining agreements for the various crafts or classes of employees on the principal rail carriers of the United States. The data in this table summarize the detailed information for the individual carriers shown in table 14, and indicate the breadth of the scope of representation by the various national labor organizations.

3. AGREEMENTS ON PRINCIPAL CARRIERS

Tables 14 (a) and (b) present a summary of the collective bargaining agreements in effect as of June 30, 1947, on carriers subject to the Railway Labor Act. It will be noted that table 14 (a) is devoted to agreements on class I railroads while table 14 (b) summarizes agreements in effect on The Pullman Co. and the Railway Express Agency, Inc. Similar information respecting labor agreements on the major scheduled airlines subject to the Railway Labor Act is presented in table 14 (c).

Opposite the name of each carrier shown in the tables are given the initials of the name of the organizations holding the agreement for each craft or class of employees. National organizations are shown by the initials of their names, local unions by the designation "LU," and system associations by the letters "SA." The tables carry all current agreements for the carriers named which are on file with the Board with effective dates not later than June 30, 1947.

VII. INTERPRETATION AND APPLICATION OF AGREEMENTS

Agreements or contracts made in accordance with the Railway Labor Act are of two kinds: first, those consummated as a result of direct negotiations between carriers and representatives of their employees establishing rates of pay, rules, and working conditions; second, mediation agreements made by the same parties and also dealing with rates of pay, rules, and working conditions, but consummated with the assistance and under the auspices of the National Mediation Board. These two types of agreements are generally designated respectively as "wage and rule agreements" and "mediation agreements." The meaning, application, or interpretation of these two types of agreements occasionally leads to differences between those who are parties to them.

1. INTERPRETATION OF WAGE AND RULE AGREEMENTS

Disputes involving the application or interpretation of agreements made through negotiation between the parties are subject to the jurisdiction of the National Railroad Adjustment Board, under the provisions of section 3 of the Railway Labor Act. How that Board, through its four divisions, discharged its functions during the fiscal year 1947 is described in the report of the Board and the separate reports of the divisions, which are reproduced as appendix A to this report. Table 15, above, is a tabulation of the cases handled by Divisions for the 5-year period 1943–47, inclusive.

When the members of any of the four divisions of the Adjustment Board are unable to agree upon an award in any dispute-being considered, because of a deadlock or inability to secure a majority vote, they are required under section 3, first (1), of the act to attempt to agree upon and select a neutral person to sit with the division as a member and make an award. Failing to agree upon such neutral person within 10 days, the act provides that this situation may be certified to the National Mediation Board, whereupon the latter body selects the neutral person or referee.

The qualifications of the referee are well summarized by his official designation in the act as a "neutral person." In addition, the National Mediation Board is bound in the appointment of referees by the same provisions of the law that apply to the appointment of arbitrators. The law requires that appointees to such positions must be wholly disinterested in the controversy, impartial, and without bias as between the parties in dispute.

During the fiscal year 1947, referees were appointed by the Board in 29 separate instances. The following tabulation gives the names and residences of all persons appointed for service as referees on the Adjustment Board during the past year. The number of cases referred to referees during the year 1947 was 710, as compared with 277 during the fiscal year 1946.

2. INTERPRETATION OF MEDIATION AGREEMENTS

Under the provisions of section 5, second, of the Railway Labor Act, any controversies arising over the meaning or application of agreements reached through mediation may be resolved by interpretations of such agreements by the National Mediation Board. such controversies occur, either of the parties to a mediation agreement may apply to the Board for an interpretation, which must be made within 30 days following an open hearing, at which both sides are accorded a full opportunity to present their respective cases.

In rendering such interpretations, the Board may consider only the specific terms of such agreements, and not the application of the agreement to specific situations. This restriction on the interpretive duties of the Board is necessary to prevent confusion and overlapping of its responsibilities in this respect with those of the National Railroad Adjustment Board, or any other adjustment board provided for by the law. The act makes it the specific duty of adjust-

ment boards to decide disputes arising out of grievances of the employees, or out of the interpretation or application of agreements.

During the fiscal year 1947, the National Mediation Board interpreted three mediation agreements. The first case involved the Great Northern Railway Co. and the American Train Dispatchers Association. The mediation agreement in question was made on March 14, 1942, Case A-1122-A, between certain carriers represented by the Western Carriers' Conference Committee, including the Great Northern, and the association, and covered, among other subjects, a provision that time worked in excess of 8 hours "on any day" will be considered overtime, and paid for at the rate of time and one-half. Following a public hearing, as required by the act, and consideration of evidence and agreements presented at the hearing, the Board's interpretation was rendered on January 31, 1947. In its interpretation, the Board ruled that the phrase "on any day" means the 24 hours succeeding the commencement of an assignment.

The second interpretation case involved a controversy between the Chicago & Illinois Midland Railway Co. and the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen over the meaning of a mediation agreement made in Case A-2281, on April 8, 1946. The dispute here was whether yard foremen are a part of the craft or class of yardmen, represented by the brotherhood, or whether they belonged to the road conductors' craft or class, represented by the Order of Railway Conductors. A hearing was held by the Board on April 10, 1947, and after consideration of evidence and argument presented, the Board issued a ruling on April 25, 1947, in which it found that the basic dispute was whether the Order of Railway Conductors or the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen should represent these yard foremen. The Board therefore found that a representation dispute existed among the craft or class of yardmen, consisting of yard foremen and helpers, and ordered an investigation of this dispute, which later resulted in an election conducted among the employees in this craft or class.

The third interpretation made during the fiscal year 1947 was in connection with a mediation agreement in Case A-2465 made between the New York Central Railroad Co. and the National Council, Railway Patrolmen's Unions, A. F. of L., dated January 30, 1947. dispute between the parties in this instance was over the proper interpretation of a rule in the agreement which provided that, when required by proper authority, an employee assigned to perform the duties of a position of a higher grade will receive the higher rate for the time actually worked on the higher rated position. ization construed this rule to prevent the blanking of higher rated jobs on rest days assigned to such positions, and when their occupants are on leave of absence. A hearing was conducted by the Board on May 29, 1947. After the consideration of evidence and arguments presented, the Board issued an interpretation on June 25, 1947, in which it found that the rule in question is not a guarantee rule, and that the filling of higher rated positions on their assigned rest days, and where vacant account leaves of absence, is a matter of discretion with the management, according to the service require-

Since July 21, 1934, the Board has made interpretations on only 18 questions growing out of a total of 1,368 mediation agreements.

VIII. ORGANIZATION AND FINANCES OF THE NATIONAL MEDIATION BOARD

1. ORGANIZATION

The National Mediation Board is composed of three members, appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. The terms of office, except in case of a vacancy due to an unexpired term, are for 3 years, the term of one member expiring on January 31 of each calendar year. The act makes no provision for holding over beyond that date and requires that the Board shall annually designate one of its members to serve as chairman. Not more than two members may be of the same political party. The Board's headquarters and office staff are located in the Federal Works Agency Building, Washington, D. C., at Eighteenth and F Streets NW. In addition to its office staff, the Board has a staff of mediators,

who spend practically their entire time in field duty.

Subject to the Board's direction, administration of the Board's affairs is in charge of the secretary. While some mediation conferences are held in the Board's Washington offices, by far the larger portion of mediation services is performed in the field. These services consist of the mediation of disputes between the carriers and the representatives of their employees over changes in rates of pay, rules, and working conditions. These services also include the investigation of representation disputes among employees and the determination of such disputes by election or otherwise. This field service is performed by the members of the Board, and its staff of mediators. In addition, the Board conducts hearings when necessary in connection with representation disputes to determine employees eligible to participate in elections. The Board also conducts hearings in connection with the interpretation of mediation agreements, and appoints neutral referees and arbitrators as required.

2. FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The unexpended balance for arbitration and emergency boards has been reappropriated from year to year. The unexpended 1946 balance of \$6,271 was reappropriated and made available for the fiscal year 1947.

Annual expenditures for arbitration and emergency boards cannot be accurately budgeted due to fluctuations in the need for such boards. Also, the expenses incurred by such boards vary greatly from year to year, depending upon the nature and extent of the disputes arbitrated or considered by emergency boards. Since the needs for such boards cannot be accurately anticipated, it is necessary to have available adequate funds to meet such contingencies.

CLASSES OF DISPUTES TO BE HANDLED

The disputes between an employee or group of employees and a carrier or carriers growing out of grievances or out of the interpretation or application of agreementsconcerning rates of pay, rules, or working conditions, including cases pending and unadjusted on the date of approval of this act, shall be handled in the usual manner up to and including the chief operating officer of the carrier designated to handle such disputes; but, failing to reach an adjustment in this manner, the disputes may be referred by petition of the parties or by either party to the appropriate divisions of the Adjustment Board with a full statement of the facts and all supporting data bearing upon the disputes.

ORGANIZATION

The First Division of the National Railroad Adjustment Board was established by Congress by amendment (Public, No. 442, 73d Cong.), to the Railway Labor Act.

Pursuant to and in accordance with section 3, subdivision (u) of said amendment, the First Division was organized on July 31, 1934, by the selection of a chairman, a vice chairman, and a secretary.

The First Division consists of 10 members—5 selected, designated and paid by the carriers, and 5 selected, designated and paid by 5 labor organizations of railroad employees, national in scope, in accordance with the provisions of the Railway Labor Act.

JURISDICTION

The First Division took over the work of the four regional train service boards, adding thereto the representation of many carriers not parties to any of the regional boards, and also the Switchmen's Union of North America as parties to the Division.

The First Division has jurisdiction over disputes involving train and yard-service employees of carriers; that is, engineers, firemen, hostlers, and outside hostler helpers, conductors, trainmen, and yard-service employees.

APPENDIX D

EXECUTIVE ORDER 9172, ESTABLISHING A PANEL FOR THE CREATION OF EMERGENCY BOARDS FOR THE ADJUSTMENT OF RAILWAY LABOR DISPUTES

Whereas, section 5 of the Railway Labor Act, as amended (ch. 8, title 45, U. S. C.) provides that for a period of thirty days after mediatory efforts of the National Mediation Board have failed to settle a dispute "no change shall be made in the rates of pay, rules, or working conditions or established practices in effect prior to the time the dispute arose;" and

Whereas, duly designated and authorized representatives of employees may, during this thirty-day period, take a strike vote and fix a date for the strike to

become effective; and

Whereas, section 10 of the said Railway Labor Act requires the National Mediation Board to notify the President if an unadjusted dispute threatens, in its judgment, substantially to interrupt interstate commerce to a degree such as to deprive any section of the country of essential transportation service, and provides that upon receipt of such notification the President may, in his discretion, create a board to investigate and report respecting such dispute; and

Whereas, the national interest demands that for the effective prosecution of the war, there shall be no strike votes taken, or dates fixed for the beginning of strikes, or strikes, lock-outs, embargoes put into effect, which would affect the transporta-

tion industry covered by the Railway Labor Act.

Now, therefore, by virture of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the Statutes of the United States, and in order to adjust the policies and procedures under the said Act to the requirements of the war emergency, it is hereby ordered

as follows:

1. There is hereby created, for the duration of the war and six months thereafter, a National Railway Labor Panel of nine members, hereinafter referred to as the Panel, to be appointed by the President, and to be qualified as to membership thereon in the same manner as provided in section 10 of the Railway Labor Act for membership on emergency boards. The President shall designate a chairman from the members of the Panel and shall fill vacancies thereon as they may occur. The Chairman of the Panel shall receive such compensation, together with necessary traveling expenses, as the President may prescribe. The members of the Panel shall receive necessary travel expenses and subsistence expenses or per diem allowances in lieu thereof on such days as they are actually engaged in performance

of duties pursuant to this Order.

2. Whenever a dispute between a carrier or carriers and its or their employees concerning changes in rates of pay, rules, or working conditions, or whenever any other dispute not referable to the National Railroad Adjustment Board, is not adjusted or settled under the provisions of Sections 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of the Railway Labor Act, the duly designated and authorized representatives of employees involved in such dispute may, prior to notice by the National Mediation Board to the President of a threatened interruption to commerce, notify the Chairman of the Panel of the failure of the parties to adjust the dispute and of their desire to avoid the taking of a strike vote and the setting of a strike date. If, in the judgment of the Chairman of the Panel, the dispute is such that if unadjusted, even in the absence of a strike vote, it may interfere with the prosecution of the war, he may thereupon select three members of the Panel to serve as an emergency board to investigate such dispute and to report thereon to the President. Subject to the provisions of section 10, such board shall have exclusive and final jurisdiction of the dispute and shall make every reasonable effort to settle such dispute.

3. The National Mediation Board shall furnish the Panel stenographic, investi-

3. The National Mediation Board shall furnish the Panel stenographic, investigative, and such other facilities as may be necessary; and within the limits of the funds provided, and upon the certification of the Chairman of the Panel, shall

make such other disbursements as are necessary to effectuate this order.

APPENDIX E

EXECUTIVE ORDER 9299, PRESCRIBING REGULATIONS AND PRO-CEDURE WITH RESPECT TO WAGE AND SALARY ADJUSTMENTS FOR EMPLOYEES SUBJECT TO THE RAILWAY LABOR ACT

By virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and statutes of the United States, and more particularly by the act of October 2, 1942 (Public

Law 729, 77th Congress), it is hereby ordered:

1. No increases in the wage rates or salary of any employee subject to the provisions of the Railway Labor Act, whether granted as a result of voluntary agreement, collective bargaining, conciliation, arbitration, or otherwise, and no decreases in such wage rates or salary, shall be made except in accordance with the provisions of this order; provided, however, that nothing contained in this order or Executive Order No. 9250 shall be construed as affecting the procedure or limiting the jurisdiction of either the National Mediation Board, as defined in the Railway Labor Act, or the National Railway Labor Panel, as defined in Executive Order No. 9172, except as herein specifically set forth.

2. No carrier shall make any change in wage rates, except such changes as by general order of the National War Labor Board, or by regulations of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, are permitted to be made without the specific approval of the Board or the Commissioner, as the case may be, unless notice of such proposed change shall have been filed with the Chairman of the National Railway Labor Panel, created by Executive Order No. 9172, and shall have been

permitted to become effective as hereinafter provided.

Notwithstanding section 4001.2 of the Regulations of the Economic Stabilization Director, for the purpose of determining what wage and salary adjustments may be made without any specific approval, the general orders of the National War Labor Board shall be applicable to all employees subject to the Railway Labor Act, except those receiving salaries at the rate of \$5,000 or more per annum in regard to whom the regulations of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue shall apply. But any adjustment of salary under \$5,000 heretofore approved by the Commissioner shall not be affected by this order. shall apply.

3. If the chairman of the National Railway Labor Panel has reason to believe that the proposed change, in wage rates or salary, may not conform to the standards prescribed in Executive Order No. 9250, or to the general stabilization program made effective thereunder, or to the directives on policy issued by the Economic Stabilization Director thereunder and the proposed change is not modified to conform to such standards, program, and directives, he shall designate three members of the Panel as an Emergency Board to investigate the proposed change and to report to the President. Otherwise, the Chairman of the Panel

may permit the proposed change to become effective.

4. Emergency Boards, whether designated pursuant to the Railway Labor Act, Executive Order No. 9172, or section 3 of this order, in reporting to the President shall certify that their recommendations in regard to any proposed change affecting wage and salary payments conform with the standards prescribed in Executive Order No. 9250, the general stabilization program made effective thereunder, and with the directives on policy issued by the Economic

Stabilization Director thereunder.

5. Copies of the report with recommendations made to the President by any Emergency Board under section 4 of this order shall be filed by the Board forthwith with the Economic Stabilization Director, the National War Labor Board and the Commissioner of Internal Revenue. The Economic Stabilization Director may on behalf of himself or other departments and agencies concerned, report to the President the effect of the recommendations on the general stabilization program. Unless and except to the extent that the Economic Stabilization Director shall otherwise direct, the recommendations of the Emergency Board

in regard to proposed changes affecting wages and salary payments shall, upon the expiration of thirty days after the report is filed with the President, become

effective.

6. The National War Labor Board and the Commissioner of Internal Revenue shall either rule on any application for approval of wage and salary adjustments now before the Board and the Commissioner or transfer it to the Chairman of the National Railway Labor Panel. The Board and the Commissioner shall not rule on any application hereafter made.
